Food policy

This summer, Agriculture and Agri-Food Minister Lawrence MacAulay is seeking public input in order to draft Canada's first ever food policy. We held three Democracy Talks on food policy at the Gibsons Public Market, the West Vancouver Community Centre and the Whistler Maury Young Arts Centre.

The key areas we focused on are 1) how to increase access to affordable, nutritious food 2) what health and safety concerns are most important when it comes to the food we eat 3) what concerns we have about the environmental impact of food production and 4) what initiatives could be undertaken to grow more high quality food in Canada. Key ideas included: 1) the importance of supporting local growing and the importance of educating people about nutrition and health 2) improved food labelling and revising Canada's food guide (which is underway) 3) improve conservation, transition to closed containment salmon aquaculture, do a better job of eliminating food waste and 4) support food exchange and define what high quality healthy food is and promote it that way.

Proposed federal tax changes

Finance Minister Bill Morneau introduced proposals to change the tax structures for private corporations in Canada. I began to receive letters and phone calls on this matter beginning in mid-July. I have been returning each and every call and piece of correspondence personally, because I know how concerned people are. As well, I am grateful for the constructive suggestions in terms of tackling tax fairness.

The short time frame for consultation is very challenging. My team has kept close track of all of your input, and I will be meeting in Ottawa with the Minister and his staff as soon as the House returns during the week of September 18th. I am writing this on September 12th. Please send us the form on the back with your comments on this or any other issue.

On June 10th, together with DFO staff and numerous community volunteer organizations, we hosted a public open house at the DFO lab on Marine Drive in Caulfeild. The last time the public had been invited in was 1973! In the space of a few hours, almost 1000 people toured the site and learned about its exciting future.

I would like to thank Mayor Mike Smith, Parliamentary Secretary Terry Beech, Squamish

Nation Councillor Chris Lewis and Tseil-Waututh Chief Maureen Thomas for speaking on behalf of the community and Canada, as we put forth a vision for the lab that will ensure it is open to the public and it is producing world leading science research. The West Van Lab is here to stay!

Minister LeBlanc has asked me to lead the effort to renew and reinvest in the lab for the long term. The process is underway, and I look forward to keeping you informed on our progress.

Salmonid enhancement program

Last spring, we faced a significant challenge in that the very important Salmonid Enhancement Program's education and restoration unit was cut. This was inexplicable to me and thousands of volunteers in British Columbia.

In the context of a recent exhaustive review of DFO, and the subsequent Treasury Board approval of \$1.4 billion of new funding, cutting this \$2 million program that leverages so much more in donations and volunteer effort really made no sense. Thankfully, Jennifer Thuncher at the Squamish Chief newspaper broke the story and the community took it from there. Streamkeepers and scientists, not-for-profit groups, teachers and students were phenomenal supporters in helping me and my fellow BC MP's, across all parties, to appeal to Minister LeBlanc to restore this funding.

Your voices, action and commitment to wild salmon made all the difference. Within weeks, the program was back in place and fully funded. Today, applications under the new \$75 million Coastal Restoration Fund are pouring in.

I look forward to continuing to support our community in its longstanding work to protect and restore wild salmon habitat.

Democracy talks

June: Canada-US relations

Our Constituency Youth Council hosted their own Democracy Talks at the West Vancouver Memorial Library, inviting their friends, classmates and sports teams to take part. The goal was to engage youth in public affairs.

International trade

Our government is focused on diversifying markets for Canadian businesses, with a particular focus on the Asia Pacific region.

In the spring, I visited Vietnam, Singapore and Brunei to promote Canadian softwood lumber products. It was really very positive to visit a coffee shop outside Ho Chi Minh City where the interior walls were covered in BC plywood. In all three countries, we hosted roundtables with women entrepreneurs: because women leading in business is central to our approach to inclusive, progressive trade.

In June, I participated with the Hon. Jean Chrétien and Canada’s Trade Commissioner, Ailish Campbell, at a Denton’s roundtable for Ambassadors in Ottawa. I was particularly excited to share the updated Canada-Chile Free Trade Agreement because it includes a gender chapter—the first gender chapter in a trade agreement for any G7 or G20 country. Mr. Chrétien was the original proponent of the Canada-Chile agreement. A good reminder of how governments build on what went before.

In May, I participated in President Xi’s One Belt One Road forum in Beijing, on behalf of Canada. As China embarks on ambitious infrastructure investment, Canadian companies are well positioned to compete.

In September, I joined Canada’s Ambassador to the Philippines, John Holmes, and our new

ambassador to ASEAN (Association of South East Asia Nations), Marie-Louise Hassan, in Manila at the ASEAN Economic Ministers Meeting. When Minister Freeland was International Trade Minister, she asked that Canada and ASEAN study the feasibility of a free trade agreement. The study is now complete and indicates that a free trade agreement between us would be mutually beneficial. The ten ASEAN countries represent a population of 620 million people—a large and fast growing market. Our goal was to secure agreement to enter exploratory talks toward a free trade agreement. We were successful and I look forward to continuing to

build on our strong people to people relationships toward opening new markets..

The Canada-EU Free Trade Agreement is now being provisionally applied. As of September 21st, 9,000 tariff lines came down. Canada will have the most preferred access to the European market of any country outside the EU. I encourage businesses to be in touch with Christian Hansen, Regional Director and Senior Trade Commissioner in Vancouver (604-666-8888) for support in accessing this important market for your goods and services.

Canada Summer Jobs

On July 6th, we were thrilled to be at the base of Blackcomb Mountain in Whistler for the Honourable Patty Hajdu’s Canada Summer Jobs announcement. Whistler Off Road Cycling Association attended the announcement, along with their summer students Makaela and Kolt.

With the goal of giving young people the opportunity to work in their field of study, our government invested \$782,358 in our community this year, partnering with local businesses and non-profit organizations to create jobs for 213 students working on over 100 projects.

On the Sunshine Coast, summer student Philip was hired to work on a mapping project at the Sunshine Coast Community Resource Centre. His employer was so impressed with his talent that he has recently been added to their Board of Directors following a bylaw change to allow people under 18 to be on the board! Congratulations Philip.

In Squamish, the addition of four students at the Arts Council kept the doors open throughout July and August. One student was responsible for curating exhibits and three others worked in marketing and communications.
